Detailed Drawbacks of Valletta Living

Valletta is a desirable area for living because of its lively culture and rich past. Nonetheless, the city has its own problems that can have a big impact on its citizens. An extensive examination of the possible drawbacks of live in Malta's capital can be found below. **From the comments i got from several people, there are more negative aspects than positive.**

1. High Cost of Living

Urban regeneration and tourism have led to high property prices and rents in Valletta, making it difficult for locals to afford housing. Small and historic homes may require expensive renovations. Shops and restaurants target tourists, resulting in higher prices for basic goods and services. Limited supermarkets and local markets also limit options for affordable living. We also asked the Valletta Local Council if the majority of residents renting or owners. They replied with:

“Valletta has a mix of residents, but in recent years, renting has become more common due to the demand for properties in the city, particularly from short-term rental platforms.”

2. Parking and Transportation Issues

Valletta faces parking and transportation issues due to narrow streets and limited designated zones, making car ownership difficult. Public transport is slow and uncomfortable during peak hours due to crowded buses and traffic congestion, and schedules may not always align with residents' needs, especially during night or holidays. Before, in the old times, Pjazza San Gorg was open for parking, it was easier to park. As of this frustration of not finding a parking in Valletta, the Valletta local council created the *Controlled Vehicular Access system in Valletta*.

There are 3 types or parking:

White parking spaces are for everyone, all the time - If you're not a resident, this parking space is pretty much as good as a garage; you can't park.

Green is only for Valletta residents, all the time - Basically, from 6pm to 6am, blue bays are reserved for residents.

Blue is a combination of both, depending on the time - From 6am to 6pm (which pretty much covers most working days), any car can use a blue parking bay, which is great and very useful for the people who work in the capital city. ³

According to the residents though, more enforcement is needed, not all people use the parking as its intended to.

“Access for the first 30 minutes is free of charge, which is good news if you're looking to pop by for a very quick errand. Beyond that, it's 82c per hour, with a maximum charge of €6.52 daily. More recently, a system was put in place whereby parking was also made free for entrances after 2pm between Monday and Friday and all day long on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays.” ⁴



Throwing it back to a time when cars used to park in front of the Grand Master's Palace at St. George's Square, Valletta's largest and most iconic square.

With roots going back to the 17th century, this historic square has been the backdrop for many significant events in Malta's history, from royal visits to victory celebrations, and the presentation of the George Cross in 1942.
